C-1

Understanding Political Theory

The core objective of this course is to introduce the students to the idea of political theory, its history and approaches, and an assessment of its critical and contemporary trends. The course will also acquaint the students with the ideas and practices related to State, Citizenship and Democracy.

C-2

Constitutional Government and Democracy in India

This course acquaints the students with the constitutional design of states' structure and institutions and their actual working over time. The course also encourages a study of state institutions in their mutual interaction and in interaction with the larger extra-constitutional environment.

C-3

Political Theory: Concepts and Debates

The main objective of this course is to acquaint the students with the basic normative concepts of political theory. The course is designed to encourage critical and reflective analysis and interpretation of social practices through the relevant conceptual toolkit. Further this course introduces the students to the important debates in the subject.

C-4

Political Process in India

This course maps the working of 'modern' institutions, premised on the existence of an individuated society. In a context marked by communitarian solidarities and their mutual transformation thereby. It also familiarizes students with the working of the Indian state, paying attention to the contradictory dynamics of modern state power.

C-5

Introduction to Comparative Government and Politics

The basic objective of this course is to familiarize students with the basic concepts and approaches to the study of comparative politics. The course will focus on examining politics in a historical framework while engaging with various themes of comparative analysis in developed and developing countries.

C-6

Perspectives on Public Administration

The basic idea of this course is to provide an introduction to the discipline of public administration. The paper encompasses public administration in its historical context with an emphasis on the various classical and contemporary administrative theories. The course also attempts to provide the students with a comprehensive understanding on contemporary administrative developments.

C-7

Perspectives on International Relations and World History

The key objective of this course is to equip students with the basic intellectual tools for understanding International Relations. The paper introduces students to some of the most important theoretical approaches for studying international relations.

C-8

Political Process and Institutions in Comparative Perspective

This course will try to train the students in the application of comparative methods to the study of politics. The course aims to introduce undergraduate students to some of the range of issues, literature and methods that cover comparative political perspectives.

C-9

Public Policy and Administration in India

This main objective of this paper is to provide an introduction to the interface between public policy and administration in India. The paper deals with issues of decentralization, financial management, citizens and administration and social welfare from a non-western perspective.

C-10

Global Politics

Course Outcome: This paper introduces students to the key debates on the meaning and nature of globalization by addressing its political, economic, social, cultural and technological dimensions. The course also offers insights into key contemporary global issues such as the proliferation of nuclear weapons, ecological issues, international terrorism and human security before concluding with a debate on the phenomenon of global governance.

C-11

Classical Political Philosophy

This is a basic foundation course for students. This paper tries to familiarize students with the manner in which the political questions were first posed. Machiavelli comes as an interlude inaugurating modern politics followed by Hobbes and Locke.

C-12

Indian Political Thought-I

This course introduces the specific elements of Indian Political Thought spanning over two millennia. It tries to provide a sense of the broad streams of Indian thought while encouraging a specific knowledge of individual thinkers and texts.

DSE-1A

Contemporary Politics in Assam

The prime objective of this course is to acquaint students with the politics of contemporary Assam and its neighbouring states. Moreover, being located in the Northeast region it is invariably the concern of the students to have proper understanding of the region.

DSE-2A

Human Rights in a Comparative Perspective

The main objective of this course is to build an understanding of human rights among students through a study of specific issues in a comparative perspective. The course seeks to anchor all issues in the Indian context and pulls out another country to form a broader comparative framework.

Modern Political Philosophy

The basic objective of this paper is to give students some idea about two of the most closely intertwined concepts i.e., Philosophy and Politics. Indian Political thought-II

This course introduces a wide span of thinkers and themes that defines the modernity of Indian Political Thought. The key objective of the course is to study general themes that have been produced by thinkers from varied social and temporal contexts.

DSE-3A

Public Policy in India

The basic objective of this course is to provide a theoretical and practical understanding of the concepts and methods that can be employed in the analysis of public policy. The course will be useful for students who seek an integrative link to their understanding of political science, economic theory and the practical world of development and social change.

DSE-4A

India's Foreign Policy in a Globalizing World

The objective of this course is to teach students the domestic sources and the structural constraints on the genesis, evolution and practice of India's foreign policy. The course endeavours to highlight integral linkages between the 'domestic' and the 'international' aspects of India's foreign policy by stressing on the shifts in its domestic identity and the corresponding changes at the international level.

After completion of this course students will be able to know the struggle of Indian people against colonialism from different theoretical perspective.

Gandhi and the Contemporary World

After completion of this course students will be able to understand Gandhian philosophy and its practical implementations in the contemporary world and enable to critically evaluate his legacy.
